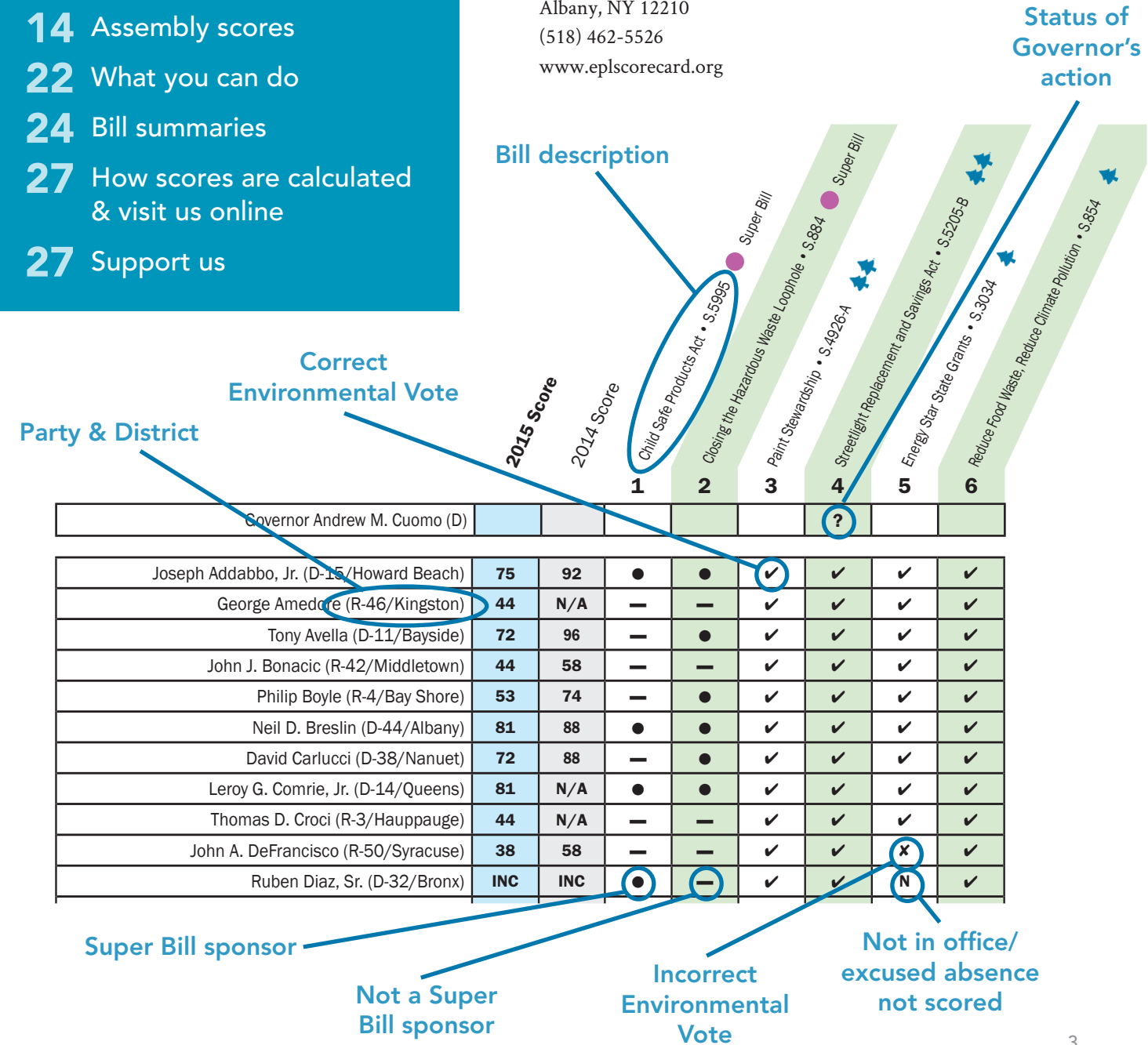
The cover art of this Scorecard is meant to draw attention to what will be one of the big policy issues of 2016: clean drinking and wastewater infrastructure. Last year's cover by artist John de Rosier helped educate legislators and the public about the inadequate engagement on oil trains by the Governor and Legislature, including the near rubber-stamping of a plan to ship dangerous and carbon intensive Tar Sands down the Hudson River. In 2016 and beyond, few issues are hurting our communities more than an aging and outdated drinking and wastewater infrastructure. Simply put, you cannot build a 21st Century economy on 19th Century pipes. New Yorkers have the right to clean, safe water. And with communities facing more than \$36 billion in unmet needs in the coming years, the state must make an annual investment of \$800 million to keep New Yorkers safe.

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EPL/Environmental Advocates is one of the first organizations in the nation formed to advocate for the future of a state's environment and the health of its citizens. Through lobbying, advocacy, coalition building, citizen education, and policy development, EPL/Environmental Advocates has been New York's environmental conscience more than for 45 years. 2015: THE BIG PICTURE

While Albany's ethical scandals are nothing new, the 2015 Legislative Session will likely be remembered for the unprecedented upending of the political careers of both Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver and Senate Majority Leader Dean Skelos, as well as corruption trials and inaction on important policy issues.

As part of the Governor's opening address to the Legislature in January, he referred to himself and the two leaders as the "three amigos" indicating that they'd work together in his second term as closely as they had in his first.

Now, two of those three "amigos" are facing federal corruption trials.

And as we see yet again, the more things change the more they stay the same.

Amidst the legislative tumult and transition, there were pockets of progress for the environment, egregious deals that will set New York back, and disappointment as new legislative leaders and committee chairs failed to agree on a number of vital bills to improve the lives of all New Yorkers as the session closed in June.

Fiscal Stress

The budget dominates the first three months of the session and it is where many environmental wins can be had, but also where bad decisions by one party or another can come together overnight. This year we saw both happen.

Significant reforms were made to the brownfield tax credit program. Instead of remaining a blatant giveaway for developers to build in already attractive real estate markets, more tax dollars will be directed toward toxic site cleanup in the areas most in need of development incentives. Unfortunately, legislators did not fix all of the problems with the broken program, particularly Upstate, and the program will require significant watchdogging in the years ahead.

As crude oil trains roll through the state on the way to the global market, the Oil Spill Cleanup Fund was boosted, and a portion of the new revenue was earmarked for spill preparedness; the Legislature heeded the advice of local government leaders to

keep the fund under the watchful eye of Comptroller DiNapoli, instead of allowing the Governor carte blanche.

Despite broad support, in his Executive Budget the Governor refused to spend any of the \$5 billion-plus in windfall from legal settlements with financial institutions on environmental infrastructure, despite a documented funding gap of \$800 million every year. The Legislature did wrangle out of the Governor a new \$200 million, three-year program, to provide grants to localities in desperate need of funds to fix their drinking water and waste water systems, which was an example of the Legislature exercising its constitutional powers of checks and balances. While this is a good first step, Governor Cuomo and the Legislature must provide significantly more funding for New York's crumbling infrastructure.

A big blot on the budget – and quite frankly his record – was Governor Cuomo's egregious raid of the clean energy and carbon pollution funds generated through the state's auction of carbon pollution allowances under the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI). Despite calling for government to act on climate, and touting RGGI's successes, \$41 million was redirected from carbon reduction to the state's general fund. The raid is a loss of more than \$120 million in economic development and energy waste reduction, and placed the program's operating budget \$20 million in the red; this came even as the state budget provided tax breaks for luxury yachts and private airplanes. Raiding RGGI makes no sense, especially given the State's goal of reducing climate pollution to near zero in just 35 years.

The "People's Business"

As he rose from the ashes of his predecessors' demise, Senator Flanagan stated repeatedly that he'd get the Senate back to work doing the "people's business." The task at hand was simple enough: start by allowing fair up or down votes on legislation sponsored by a bipartisan majority of his colleagues.

Given that he instead let several broadly supported bills die in committee, it is not at all clear which "people" he was referring to.

When it came to acting on climate, ridding our waters of plastic microbeads, preventing poisons from being



used in children’s products, or addressing dangerous fracking waste, he prioritized big polluters over the people and the communities of this state.

During his first session as leader, the Child Safe Products Act had 41 Senate sponsors, the Microbead-Free Waters Act had 37 sponsors (both of these bills had already passed the Assembly), and Closure of the Fracking Waste Loophole bill had 33 sponsors.

It takes just 32 votes in support for a bill to pass the Senate.

Instead of charting a new, open, and accountable path, Senator Flanagan stayed on that set by Senator Skelos and refused to allow his colleagues a fair vote.

The “people’s business,” indeed.

Shine a Light on It

The one green bill that passed both houses this year is the Streetlight Replacement and Savings Act, which allows municipalities to acquire streetlights from utilities, empowering them to improve their quality, as

well as cut energy waste and the pollution associated with the energy production.

The bill is an elegant first step as New York digs deeper to meet the state goal of cutting carbon pollution by 40 percent over the next 15 years.

It may come as a surprise, but outdoor lighting typically represents one of the largest categories of energy use and costs for municipalities, but utility ownership of streetlight equipment often prevents local governments from making cost effective investments in efficient lighting technologies, like LEDs, that would cut back on energy waste and unnecessary spending, helping to ease the burden on local taxpayers.

Earth Day Turns 40

To mark the 40th Anniversary of Earth Day, environmentalists joined with Assembly members and Senators from both sides of the aisle to support a call for action: to address the impacts of our changing climate, to rid children’s products of poisons, and to get plastic out of our waterways.

The Assembly rose to meet the challenge debating and passing bills to address all three and more.

All the Senate did was pass a resolution marking the anniversary and then debating why it did not mention “climate change.” During that debate, Senator John DeFrancisco said Syracuse was cold in the winter of 2014-15, which, for him, is evidence that global warming does not exist.

As the election year of 2016 approaches, EPL/ Environmental Advocates will continue to fight for healthy air, clean water and protected landscapes and wildlife. We have our work cut out for us in educating the public about the differences between what their elected officials say when asking for votes and how they behave once they’re behind the Capitol’s closed doors.

Welcoming Two New Chairs

Due to the retirement of **Bob Sweeney** from the Assembly and the electoral defeat of **Mark Grisanti** in the Senate, we went into the 2015 knowing it would be a monumental time of transition for green advocates.



In the Assembly, **Steve Englebright (D-Setauket)** was appointed the new Chair of the Environmental Conservation Committee. Assemblyman Englebright brings to this committee more than 20 years of experience as a member of the Assembly, as well as his background as a professor of geology and time spent

serving in local government. This session he led the Assembly passage of bills address climate change, invest in clean water, and remove toxic chemicals from children’s products; most of these efforts died in the Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

He was also appointed Chair of the Climate Change Work Group, an Assembly body which we expect will be a vocal leader in codifying Governor Cuomo’s stated goals of reducing carbon emissions and ramping up clean energy generation.



Senator Thomas O’Mara (R-Elmira) was appointed chair of the Senate committee. Senator O’Mara is in his third term after previously serving 6 years in the Assembly. He described his service in office as being guided by the belief that “government does not create jobs, business does.”

Along with failing to address the raft of bills that the Assembly passed and which a majority of his colleagues supported, he used the committee to instead advance several industry-friendly bills. However, even those were not brought to the floor for a vote due to a lack of support from his colleagues, which is exactly what industry wanted to happen.

The biggest unknown for the green agenda in 2015 was how the new chairs would work together to protect New Yorkers and our public health, and improve the environment. While their own transition as well as the turnover in Legislative leadership complicated their first year, the inability to find common ground left progress on far too many key items undone. This resulted in several efforts, widely supported by Republicans and Democrats, stalling in both chambers.

From the big issues such as acting on climate change, to “tiny” ones like ridding microbead plastics from our waters, New Yorkers are counting on their state legislators to protect them. It all starts with Chairmen Englebright and O’Mara finding common ground in 2016. It’s an important year, it’s an election year, and New Yorkers deserve to have their faith in their Legislature rebuilt. We all expect big things.

LEGISLATOR OF THE YEAR



The necessary ingredients for securing strong environmental protections include the active and sustained involvement of New Yorkers from all walks of life and a champion who fights for what is right and does not back down or shy away from the challenges inside the Capitol. While our environment and public health have many allies, champions who are ready to act, elevate issues, and get the job done are significantly fewer.

When it comes to standing up to big polluters and their allies in Albany who seek to weaken, block or delay protections, or thwart progress, New Yorkers have a new champion in **Senator Brad Hoylman (D-Manhattan)**.

In just his first year as the ranking member of the environment committee, Senator Hoylman has established himself as a force to be reckoned with. He came to each committee meeting thoroughly prepared, he debated the provisions of bills and he typically led the discussion on the merits and how real people would be helped or hurt by legislation. He raised numerous floor amendments to bills including one to block Governor Cuomo's \$41 million raid of climate pollution reduction funds. He also led floor debates that exposed the majority's denial of climate change and its position that diesel exhaust does not cause health impacts like asthma attacks and premature deaths. He convened the State Senate's first ever forum on climate change to hear from those who are suffering from the impacts of our changing climate. That forum gave a voice to people like Rachel Rivera, a mom who lost her home during Superstorm Sandy, who implored Senate leaders to act on climate.

Senator Hoylman did everything a member in the minority could to bring the Child Safe Products Act, a bill that enjoyed the support of nearly two-thirds of all of his colleagues, up for a vote.

His impact is being felt outside of the Capitol, too, as the Senator has placed an emphasis on using his social media and communication platforms to educate and inform the public about environmental policies and ways we can make better decisions in our own lives.

New York's environment would be very well served if more legislators came to the Capitol each day with the passion and conviction demonstrated this year by Senator Hoylman. New Yorkers can be grateful for his efforts and hopeful that more of his colleagues on both sides of the aisle and in both houses will join him in 2016.

OIL SLICK AWARDS

Oil Slick #1: Senator John DeFrancisco

What does earning the lowest score in the Senate (38), outright denial of climate science, dismissing the well-established health impacts (e.g. asthma attacks, lung cancer and premature deaths) of dirty diesel and being the lead sponsor of a bill to block advancements in clean energy lead to? The dubious distinction of receiving the 2015 Oil Slick Award: Senator John DeFrancisco.

In early 2015, we thought we had an emerging champ for environmental issues when he called on the Governor to address water infrastructure needs, but alas that seemed more about political hits on the Governor than wanting to protect the environment. For most of 2015, Senator DeFrancisco seemed to relish the role of proposing legislation to weaken standards and blocking efforts by colleagues to protect our health and the environment. For all of this he earns a 2015 Oil Slick.

Oil Slick #2: Senator Dean Skelos

Courtesy of former Senate Majority leader Dean Skelos, the public may finally get a better understanding for why common-sense legislation that enjoys broad bipartisan support does not receive a Senate vote. In May, allegations surfaced that he put his family's financial interests above public interest in determining which

bills receive a vote – and several measures concerning the most pressing environmental issues of the day were stalled with an eye towards profit.

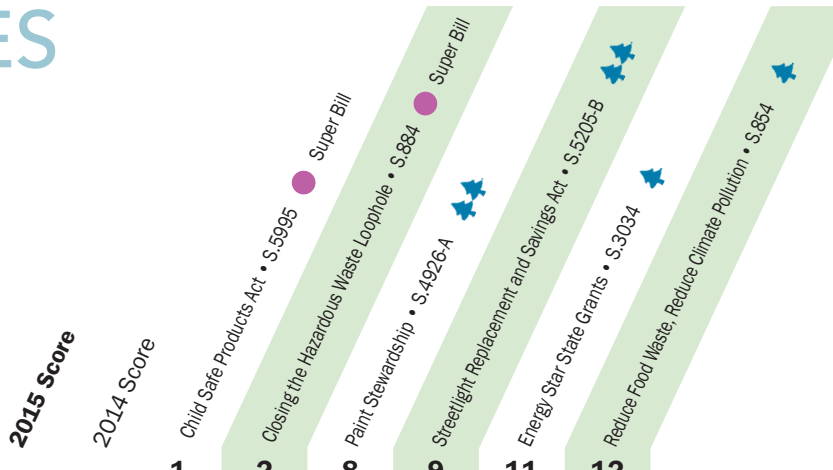
His colleagues in the Senate Majority ousted him in part due to the appearance that he blocked votes on bills including the fracking moratorium and climate action due to possible business benefits for a family member. We join the Senate Majority in condemning this behavior. Due to the frightening nature of the allegations against him, the fact that he stalled action through much of the 2015 Legislative Session, and over the years consistently has one of the worst scores in the entire Legislature, Senator Skelos deserves his 2015 Oil Slick.

A note about this years Oil Slicks: we hope and urge new Senate Majority Leader John Flanagan to move the Senate away from the dirty practices of the Skelos Senate, to instead be a body that allows votes on legislation that will lead to a cleaner and healthier future for all New York. While we remain optimistic, we're sorry to say he's off to a bad start by elevating a climate denier and Oil Slick awardee to the post of Deputy Majority Leader, but there is plenty of time and space for a course correction.



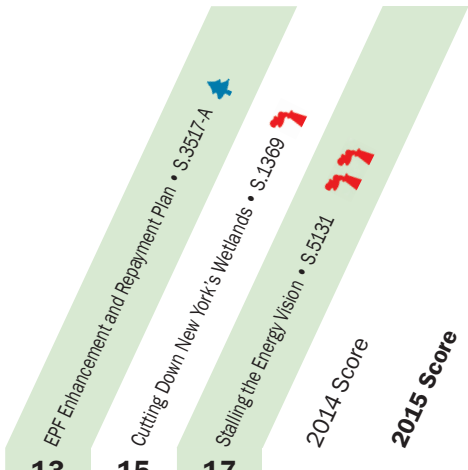

Vote at the local, state, & federal levels.

Your vote is critical when it comes to whether or not New York State protects the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the health of our families.

Contact your lawmakers.

The New York State Legislature is in regular session every year from January to June. While they are scheduled to meet for six months, in recent years budget negotiations have led to lengthier sessions and “special sessions.” Write to your legislators at New York State Assembly, Albany, NY 12248 or New York State Senate, Albany, NY 12247.

Hold legislators accountable.

If they voted to weaken New York’s environmental safeguards, send lawmakers a note expressing your disapproval. If your legislators are working to protect New York’s environment, write to thank them.

BILL SUMMARIES

To score legislation, EPL/Environmental Advocates uses ratings developed by our sister organization, Environmental Advocates of New York.

SUPER BILLS are legislative priorities chosen by the Green Panel, which includes representatives from New York State’s leading environmental groups.

Bills with 3 trees will bring major benefits to New York’s environment.

Bills with 2 trees will bring substantial benefits to New York’s environment.

Bills with 1 tree will benefit New York’s environment.

Bills with 1 smokestack will be detrimental to New York’s environment.

Bills with 2 smokestacks will be seriously detrimental to New York’s environment.

Bills with 3 smokestacks would likely result in major or lasting harm to some aspect of New York’s environment.

SUPER BILLS

1. Child Safe Products Act

Identifies chemicals of concern, prioritizes them based on the likelihood of exposure, and requires disclosure by children’s product manufacturers as to whether their products contain priority chemicals. Phases out children’s products made with priority chemicals starting January 1, 2018. Authorizes the Interstate Chemicals Clearinghouse to collect, manage, and publish the data collected from manufacturers. A.5612 (Englebright, et al.) passed Assembly; similar bill S.5995 (Hoylman, et al.) died in Senate Rules Committee.

2. Closing the Hazardous Waste Loophole

This bill makes all hazardous waste produced from oil and gas drilling subject to the same regulations for hazardous waste generation, transportation, treatment, storage, and disposal that apply to other industries operating in New York. A.6859 (Englebright, et al.)/S.884 (Avella, et al.) died in Assembly third reading; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

3 TREE ▲▲▲

3. Cover Your Crude

Requires all crude oil storage facilities to demonstrate the financial security sufficient to meet all responsibilities for the cleanup and decontamination costs associated with the release of such oil for the duration of the facility’s operations in New York State. It also requires railroad companies that transport crude oil to provide surety information to the DEC. A.7625 (Fahy, et al.)/S.5751-A (Avella, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

2 TREE ▲▲

4. Environmental Justice For All

Incorporates environmental justice principles into New York State agencies’ decision-making processes, makes

permanent the Environmental Justice Advisory Group within the DEC, and establishes an Environmental Justice Interagency Coordinating Council to report on the effectiveness and implementation of New York’s environmental justice policies within all state agencies whose actions may affect the environment agencies. A.3063 (Peoples-Stokes, et al.)/S.1525 (Parker, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

5. Environmental Justice Zones

Requires the Department of Environmental Conservation to issue biennial reports identifying environmental impact zones across the state. Such zones are defined as areas adversely affected by existing environmental hazards. The communities would be identified by analyzing aggregated toxic release and pollution data from a number of state and federal environmental databases. A.3382 (Peoples-Stokes, et al.)/S.959 (Serrano, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

6. Microbead-Free Waters Act

Prohibits the manufacture and sale of personal cosmetic products containing microbeads after December 31, 2015. This bill also amends Section 71-3703 of the Environmental Conservation law to prescribe civil penalties to violators of Title 9. A.5896 (Schimel, et al.)/S.3932 (O’Mara, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

7. Climate Protection Act

Directs the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to establish limits on greenhouse gas emissions from all major sources in New York State to achieve an 80 percent reduction in climate pollution from 1990 levels by the year 2050. A.6072 (Englebright, et al.)/S.205-A (Espaillat, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

8. Paint Stewardship (Senate)

Creates a paint stewardship program. It establishes a non-profit organization which partners with existing local government programs, expands collection infrastructure, and educates consumers. A.6199-A

(Stirpe, et al.)/S.4926-A (O’Mara, et al.) died in Assembly Environmental Conservation Committee; passed Senate.

9. Streetlight Replacement and Savings Act

Amends the public service law to provide municipalities with the option to acquire ownership and control of outdoor lighting systems currently owned by electric utilities. A.6912-C (Fahy, et al.)/S.5205-B (Griffo, et al.) passed Assembly and Senate.

10. Pesticide- Free Summer Camps

Expands a 2010 law to protect children from these avoidable hazardous substances by similarly restricting pesticide applications on camp playing fields, areas on which many children spend significant portions of their summers. This bill prohibits pesticide use on playgrounds, turf, and athletic or playing fields at children’s overnight camps and day camps except when an emergency application is warranted. A.129 (Paulin, et al.)/S.1420 (Carlucci, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Health Committee.

11. Energy Star State Grants

Requires organizations receiving funds for capital improvements from the New York State Dormitory Authority and/or the Urban Development Corporation, to use the funds to purchase Energy Star rated equipment and appliances when available. A.664 (Hevesi, et al.)/S.3034 (Hoylman, et al.) died in Assembly Ways and Means Committee; passed Senate.

12. Reduce Food Waste, Reduce Climate Pollution

The Commissioners of Education and Agriculture and Markets are directed to work together to develop guidelines by which school districts and institutions of higher education can voluntarily implement programs to donate excess, unused, edible food to local assistance programs. These guidelines include the provision of information and technical support to ensure food is

donated safely. A.4833 (Ortiz, et al.)/S.854 (Klein, et al.) died in Assembly Education Committee; passed Senate.

13. EPF Enhancement and Repayment Plan

Provides for the repayment of funds previously swept from the EPF and prescribes a schedule for increased future deposits into the EPF from RETT revenues. A.4917-A (Fahy, et al.)/S.3517-A (Marcellino, et al.) died in Assembly Environmental Conservation Committee; passed Senate.

14. Reduce Toxic Mercury in Light Bulbs

Establishes maximum mercury content standards for general purpose fluorescent light bulbs sold in New York, and authorizes the Department of Environmental Conservation to establish regulations for mercury content standards in all light bulbs. Starting January 1, 2016, it prohibits the sale of several common types of general purpose fluorescent light bulbs if they exceed the maximum mercury levels listed in the law. Special purpose lights are explicitly exempted from these restrictions until December 31, 2016. A.5844 (Kavanagh, et al.)/S.3261 (Sanders, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

1 STACK

15. Cutting Down New York’s Wetlands

Exempts landowners who seek to selectively cut timber in freshwater wetlands using access trails and heavy machinery from first obtaining a permit from the DEC. A.2475 (Magee, et al.)/S.1369 (Young, et al.) died in Assembly Environmental Conservation; passed Senate.

2 STACK

16. Redefining “Renewable” Fuels

Expands the existing biofuel wproduction tax credit to include cellulosic ethanol, densified biofuel and renewable fuel oil. The legislation also raises the credit cap from \$2.5 million to \$10 million per year and allows the credit to be claimed for ten years, instead of the existing four. A.6166 (Russell, et al.)/S.1915-A (Young, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

17. Stalling the Energy Vision

Requires studies on initiatives related to the PSC’s Reforming the Energy Vision proceeding and approaches to modernizing the state’s energy infrastructure, while blocking implementation of the very projects whose performance the PSC is being directed to evaluate. A.7808 (Russell)/S.5131 (DeFrancisco, et al.) died in Assembly Energy Committee; passed Senate.

How scores are calculated

To calculate legislators’ scores, EPL/Environmental Advocates uses ratings developed by our sister organization, Environmental Advocates of New York.

Legislators earn between 1 and 3 points respectively for votes in support of bills rated by Environmental Advocates of New York as 1, 2, or 3 “tree” bills. Tree-rated bills are those that will benefit the environment. Legislators earn between 1 and 3 points respectively for votes against bills that are given a rating of 1, 2, or 3 “smokestacks.” Smokestack-rated bills are those that will harm the environment.

Legislators earn points for supporting Super Bills—the environmental community’s top legislative priorities—as follows:

Co-sponsoring:

Lawmakers receive half-credit (1.5 points of a 3-tree bill) for Super Bills they sponsor or co-sponsor. However, if a Super Bill is voted on, the vote is counted in the score, and credit is not given for co-sponsorship. Members of the minority party who request to be added as co-sponsors also receive co-sponsorship credit.

Becoming law:

If a Super Bill is passed by both houses and signed into law, all legislators who voted for it receive 3 points plus 2 bonus points.

Incompletes:

Legislators who miss more than 20 percent of votes receive a score of incomplete (INC).
